40 years of hope - #hope4forty

The Crisis Center for South Suburbia was incorporated in 1979 and we are celebrating our 40th anniversary in 2019



It all started with a small group of caring women who had a goal of providing a safe place for women in abusive situations. Forty years later, the Crisis Center for South Suburbia continues to provide safe shelter, counseling and an array of services for those in need, free of charge.

Dianne Masters and a small group of women established a 'hotline' in a kitchen in the late 1970's and the Crisis Center for South Suburbia was incorporated on April 6th, 1979. In 1980, a farmhouse capable of sheltering 19 women and children was secured by the agency and in 1989, the board of directors initiated a capital campaign to construct a new

shelter. \$1.3 million was raised for a 35-bed shelter facility that serves as home to victims of domestic violence today.

Last year, the Crisis Center **assisted over 12,000 people and provided 35,741 service hours** and the need continues to grow.

Maureen first became involved with the organization in 1989 when she assisted in the capital campaign and secured a gift of \$10,000 from her employer at the time, Com-Ed.

Maureen says her favorite memory is when she attended a Christmas party at a local church in the early 90's. She said it was very emotional to see hundreds of children and mothers enjoying a party together. The attendees were a diverse group from different socioeconomic backgrounds, but they all faced the same challenge - surviving a violent situation at their homes.



Maureen says she also fondly remembers the feeling of shock that she experienced after learning that the Crisis Center would be receiving a \$530,000 grant that was secured by then State Representative, and now retired judge, John Doody. Those funds planted a seed to expand many of the crucial services that we provide today, including legal advocacy and transitional housing.

Maureen says the unwavering commitment of our volunteers always impresses her and she said the majority of people who become involved with the agency never want to leave. We are so grateful that Maureen never left us!
